Second, marriage provides direction, order, and stability to adult sexual unions and to their economic, social, and biological consequences. Third, marriage civilizes men, furnishing them with a sense of purpose, norms & social status that orient their lives

away from vice & toward

virtue

How little of permanent happiness can belong to a couple who are only brought together because their passions are stronger than their virtues. Fleeting emotions. Marriage is not wedding bells, white dresses, suits, ceremonies, diamond rings, banquets, & invitation cards...this is commercialized marriage....waste of time & money. A circus. It's a union of two souls. It don't need all that stage comedy to convince themselves of their union. Souls are souls...they are not consumer products to impress. Real Union comes in simplicity & sincerity. It does not need all this adornment, all this stress & angst. All it needs is God. "Our Lord! Bestow on us spouses...who will be the comfort of our eyes. A Source of Joy." (25:74) Marriage is a quiet, matter of fact union that necessitates a simple ritual of passage...A ritual of passage from one state to another...that's all. As Muhammad (p) said: Marriage is my way.

Make things easy & make them simple.

ust as true marriage is the highest blessedness that can come to man or woman, so a false marriage, a marriage conceived in vanity or avarice or sensuality, is the most fearful calamity. The binding of two loveless, selfish hearts together can only result in mutual misery. The resulting state is not simply hell, as it is frequently called. It is that more painful, but at the same time more hopeful condition, which in figurative language we may describe as the compelling of persons who are fit only for hell to dwell perpetually in heaven. It is a condition which calls for the expression of the most tender and unselfish love at every point of constant contact, imposed upon persons who have no love to give.

By Contrast...The supreme blessedness of the ideal marriage measures the superlative wretchedness of a loveless union. The sagacious husband brings to his wife a wide range of business sagacity, political influence, scientific and speculative interests. The perspicacious wife brings to her husband rich acquisitions in literary and aesthetic taste, social life

and philanthropic and religious fervor. Each life is reinforced and multiplied by all that is in the other; and thus both enter through the portals of the family into the life of the Universal Spirit, of which at best only vague and shadowy glimpses come to them in the blindness of their individualistic isolation.

Marriage, without doubt, is the greatest event in this earthly life of man or woman; it is a sacrament filled with happiness, with all that is highest and noblest in life; or it is a base counterfeit wherein sorrow and degradation usurp the place of the highest and holiest thoughts and emotions of mind and soul.

A thousand other questions of far less importance occupy the minds of the people, but this question which is of the most vital importance to a person's well-being, is kept in the background. Children are brought up so woefully ignorant that they have no conception of what awaits them in the married life. The whole subject of the relation between man and woman is tabooed; it is as though people were ashamed to think or give expression in words to things which, although sacred, nevertheless should be thoroughly understood.

Some people go on the principle that the young will find out soon enough, but it is surely a mistaken policy on the part of parents to keep their children in ignorance of the many problems that await them in wedded life. Some little light, some little knowledge might avert many tragedies that so often arise in the married life.

Here are some quotes from great minds regarding love. In Goethe's book Maxims & Reflections we find this French quotation "L'amour est un vrai recommenceur. which means [Love is truly a new beginning.]" Let it be so.

Next is Leo Tolstoy with this beautiful line: "He felt now that he was not simply close to her, but that he did not know where he ended and she began." Yeah, sexy words indeed. But the question must be asked: "What's the use of falling in love if you both remain inertly as-you-were?" The question resonates because it speaks to a central necessity of love — at its truest and most potent, love invariably does change us,

deconditioning our painful pathologies and elevating us toward our highest human potential. It allows us to break across our solitude, and then, if we're lucky, be finally transformed into something firmer.

In the romantic ideal upon which our modern mythos of love is built, the solidity of that togetherness is taken to such an extreme as to render love fragile. When lovers are expected to fuse together so closely and completely, mutuality mutates into a paralyzing codependence — a calcified and rigid firmness that becomes brittle to the possibility of growth. However...In the most nourishing kind of love, the communion of togetherness coexists with an integrity of individuality, the two aspects always in dynamic and fluid dialogue. The philosopher Martin Heidegger captured this beautifully with this statement: "Why is love rich beyond all other possible human experiences and a sweet burden to those seized in its grasp? Because we become what we love and yet remain ourselves.

By way of advice on the secret to a loving and lasting marriage, Khalil Gibran, writer/poet offers these words of wisdom:

Let there be spaces in your togetherness, And let the winds of the heavens dance between you. Love one another but make not a bond of love:

Let it rather be a moving sea between the shores of your souls.
